

Along the Mystical Carmelite Way The School of Carmel:

Lessons for Family Life

Today's fast-paced society is not known for yielding a culture of peace, contentment, or joy. Below are some ideas borrowed from Carmelite life that can be fruitful to family life.

1. Develop a routine of prayer for the family. Think of it as a spiritual framework around which an individual or family lives. Families can incorporate a structure of prayer, such as reciting the daily Rosary, or even just a decade of the Rosary, or Grace Before Meals.



- 2. Live simply. We are called to temper our attachments to wealth and pleasure. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states: "Desire for true happiness frees man from his immoderate attachment to the goods of this world so that he can find his fulfillment in the vision and beauty of God." (CCC 2548) Moderate the consumption of material goods. We cannot be truly free if we will be a slave to any earthly thing. In a sense, we empty ourselves so that we can be filled with the things of God.
- 3. Practice a spirit of quiet. Times of quiet reading, playing classical music, and, of course, prayer, can help calm the children (and the parents!) and allow everyone to be more in tune with the Holy Spirit. "In silence and quiet, the devout soul advances in virtue and learns the hidden truths of Scripture."
- 4. Trust in Divine Providence. Our Heavenly Father knows all of our needs - spiritual and temporal - and will meet them according to His Will. We can be a witness to Jesus' instruction in the passage from St. Matthew's gospel, "Rather, seek the kingdom of God



and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." (Matthew 6:33)

These are just a few examples of how we, as lay people, can grow in holiness by imitating the centuries-old traditions of the great mo-

nastic orders. We can begin by prayerfully discerning which steps to take and then making gradual changes to our lives which will bring us and our families closer to the Lord.

Cultivating the Virtues!

Human virtues are firm attitudes, stable dispositions, habitual perfections of intellect and will that govern our actions, order our passions, and guide our conduct according to reason and faith. They make possible ease, self-mastery,



and joy in leading a morally good life. the virtuous man is he who freely practices the good.

The moral virtues are acquired by human effort. They are the fruit and seed of morally good acts; they dispose all the powers of the human being for communion with divine love.

Four virtues play a pivotal role and accordingly are called "cardinal"; all the others are grouped around them. They are: prudence, justice, fortitude, and temperance.

Prudence is the virtue that disposes practical reason to discern our true good in every circumstance and to choose the right means of achieving it. Prudence is "right reason in action," writes St. Thomas Aquinas.

<u>Iustice</u> is the moral virtue that consists in the constant and firm will to give their due to God and neighbor. Justice toward God is called the "virtue of religion." Justice toward men disposes one to respect the rights of each and to establish in human relationships the harmony that promotes equity with regard to persons and to the common good.

Fortitude is the moral virtue that ensures firmness in difficulties and constancy in the pursuit of the good. It strengthens the resolve to resist temptations and to overcome obstacles in the moral life. the virtue of fortitude enables one to conquer fear, even fear of death, and to face trials and persecutions. It disposes one even to renounce and sacrifice his life in defense of a just cause. "The Lord is my strength and my song".

Temperance is the moral virtue that moderates the attraction of pleasures and provides balance in the use of created goods. It ensures the will's mastery over instincts and keeps desires within the limits of what is honorable. the temperate person directs the sensitive appetites toward what is good and maintains a healthy discretion: "Do not follow your inclination and strength, walking according to the desires of your heart."


