BLESSED SACRAMENT ADORATION

Eucharistic Adoration is a deeply significant practice in the life of a Catholic. This act of devotion allows the faithful to spend time in the real presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. Adoration not only strengthens one's personal relationship with Christ but also provides a space for peace, silence, and reflection amidst daily life.

It is a time for silent prayer, meditation, and encountering God's love in a

tangible way. As we kneel before the Blessed Sacrament we remember that the Eucharist is the center of our faith. In addition, praying before the Blessed Sacrament is an opportunity to intercede for the needs of the world, our communities, and our families. It is an act of humility and surrender, where we recognize our dependence on God and seek his grace to live as authentic disciples of Christ.

The Parish Adoration Chapel is a place of silent, personal prayer before the Blessed Sacrament.

Along the Mystical Carmelite Way Aspects of Carmelite Prayer


The Carmelite method of prayer begins with the understanding that prayer involves a relationship. The creature responds to the Creator's loving initiative through the gift of personhood. God created human beings in his image and likeness precisely so that a relationship of love might develop. This relationship begins with the particular attraction the soul experiences and grows through frequent meditation and contact (i.e. prayer).

God approaches individual souls in various ways: for example, as a Friend, Bridegroom, Savior,

Father, Child, Brother, Truth, King, and so on. He does so to elicit love. The soul must discover its chief attraction as a starting point and respond to this love.

For instance, St. Teresa of Avila (1515-1582) developed an intense love for Jesus as her closest friend. Her famous definition of prayer reveals this: "Mental prayer, in my opinion, is nothing else than an intimate sharing between friends; it means taking time frequently to be alone with Him whom we know loves us." (Life 8:7) Similarly, she says elsewhere, "Believe me, you should remain with so good a friend as long as you can ... Do you think it's some small matter to have a friend like this at your side?" (Way 26:1)

St. John of the Cross distinguished himself by a passion-



dicta (Edith Stein) was attracted to Jesus as Incarnate truth.

Participating in the Divine Nature through the 3 Theological Virtues

The human virtues are rooted in the theological virtues, which adapt man's faculties for participation in the divine nature: for the theological virtues relate directly to God. They are the foundation of Christian moral activity; they animate it and give it its special character. They inform and give life to all the moral virtues. They are the pledge of the presence and action of the Holy Spirit in the faculties of the human being. There are three theological virtues: faith, hope, and charity.

<u>Faith</u> is the theological virtue by which we believe in God and believe all that he has said and revealed to us, and that Holy Church proposes for our belief, because he is

truth itself. By faith "man freely commits his entire self to God." For this reason the believer seeks to know and do God's will.

The disciple of Christ must not only keep the faith and live on it, but also profess it, confidently bear witness to it, and spread it.



<u>Hope</u> is the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit.

The virtue of hope responds to the aspiration to happiness which God has placed in the heart of every man; it takes up the hopes that inspire men's activities and purifies them so as to order them to the Kingdom of heaven; it keeps man from discouragement; it sustains him during times of abandonment; it opens up his heart in expectation of eternal beatitude.

<u>Charity</u> is the theological virtue by which we love God above all things for his own sake, and our neighbor as ourselves for the love of God.

The practice of all the virtues is animated and inspired by charity, which "binds everything together in perfect harmony"; it is the form of the virtues; it articulates and orders them among themselves; it is the source and the goal of their Christian practice.

The fruits of charity are joy, peace, and mercy; charity demands beneficence and fraternal correction; it is benevolence; it fosters reciprocity and remains disinterested and generous; it is friendship and communion: Love is itself the fulfillment of all our works.

FREE INCOME TAX PREPARATION

For Eligible Individuals

Free income tax preparation for low income individuals is offered by the Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP), coordinated by the Canada Revenue Agency. Contact the parish office to check eligibility and to book an appointment on Saturdays from 9 AM to 12:00 PM, during the months of March and April. Each appointment will be about 30 minutes.

Tax preparations can be done in-person or by telephone interview. Let the accountant know when they call you to confirm your schedule.

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
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
